

## Book Report Options Free Choice Book

Choose one of these ideas to use for your book report. All reports will be presented to the class.

1. **DRAMATIZED REVIEW:** This option is for those of you that are reading the same book as others in your class. You and whoever is interested should prepare and present to the class one or two scenes that were especially important to the plot of your book. If you really want to be creative and have access to a video camera, you could tape your production and we could watch it in class!

2. **BOOK REVIEW:** Find a book review from a newspaper and use it as a model for a review of the book you have read. Write a review of your book as if it were to be used in a newspaper or magazine. This article must be at least 1 page typed (double spaced) or 1 1/2 pages written.

3. **A DIARY:** Pretend you are the major character in the book. Write a diary of three very important days in your life as told in the book. This diary must be 1 page typed (double spaced) or 1 1/2 pages written.

4. **A LETTER:** Choose one situation in the book and pretending to be one of the characters, write a letter to a friend telling what has happened. This letter must be 1 page typed (double spaced) or 1 1/2 pages written.

5. **THE BOOK IN PICTURES:** Cut out magazine pictures, or make your own sketches, representing important scenes in the book. Display your pictures one after another with an explanation of the action and characters you have selected. You must have a least 8 pictures with at least one sentence for each picture explaining how the picture is important to the book.

6. **INTERVIEW:** Pretend you are a reporter interviewing the important characters of your book. Tape the interview using two different voices. Ask questions that help others get a good idea of what the book is about. The interview should be at least 5 minutes long.

For those of you that are doing written projects, remember to write in complete sentences, use capital letters and periods when needed, write NEATLY, and use paragraphs--one main idea in each paragraph.

FOR ALL OF YOU--MAKE SURE SOMEONE SEES OR HEARS YOUR PROJECT BEFORE YOU PRESENT IT TO THE CLASS. SOMEONE SHOULD ALWAYS "PROOFREAD" OR "PREVIEW" YOUR WORK SO THAT YOU PRESENT THE *VERY BEST* TO THE CLASS!
