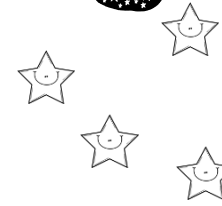

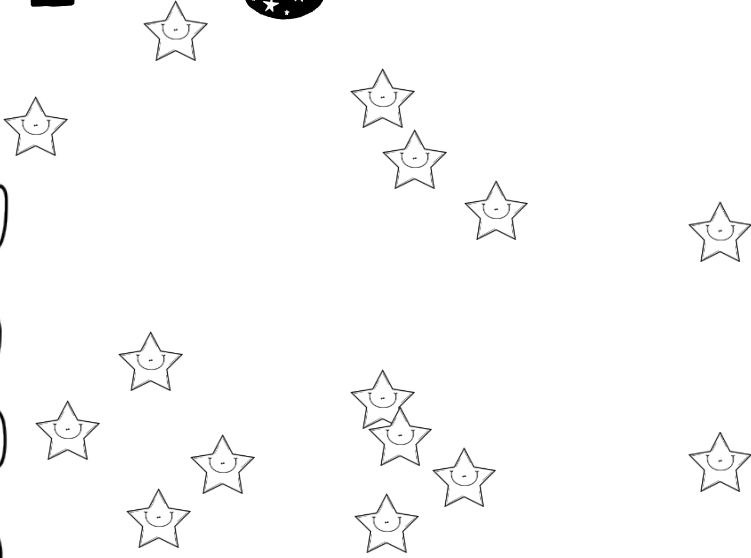

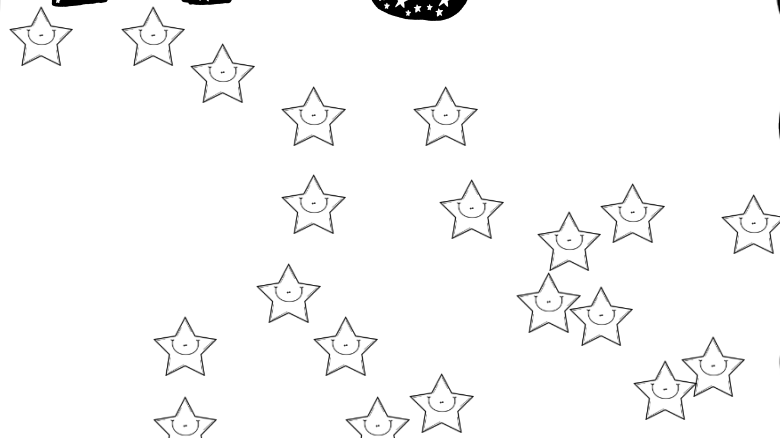
# Ursa Major
